

Mid-Term Exam Review

The mid-term exam is **Thursday March 14**. The exam has two parts: slide identification and short answer. You will be asked to identify twenty of the thirty-four slides below. Each identification will consist of three blanks, thus making each identification worth three points. For works of art or architecture where the author is known, you will be required to fill in the name of the author, name of the work, and date it was made within five years. Where the author is unknown but the site is known, then you are required to fill in the name of the work, the date it was made within five years, and location of work, monument, or structure. Short answers require a paragraph of writing. **NO BLUE BOOKS ARE NECESSARY**.
